The menu launch event, Wednesday, July 25, involved a six course taster and proceeds were donated to Katherine House Hospice.

Extension scheme at cottage agreed despite concerns

A COTTAGE near Eccleshall can be extended - despite concerns it will reduce light for a neighbouring property.
The semi-detached Stone

Cottage in Weston Lane, Bowers, and adjoining home Meadow-side cottage, have both been extended in previous years.

But the latest plans for Stone Cottage - a two storey and single storey extension to the rear and dormer to the side elevation - was called in for determination by Stafford Borough Council's planning committee.

Eccleshall councillor Jeremy Pert made the call-in request for the committee to consider the massing on site of the proposed new building and also the impact on light and privacy to neighbouring properties.'

A report to the planning committee said: "Both Stone Cottage and Meadowside Cottage have a shared character and appearance. The original buildings are a mirror of each other.

Cottage, Stone Meadow-side Cottage has been significantly extended in the past. The proposed two-storey rear extension at Stone Cottage would match the architectural form of the existing dwelling, as well as Meadow-side Cottage. The two-storey element of the proposal would not project past the two-storey element of the neighbouring extension."

Help needed to ensure village war memorial information is complete

FOLLOWING extensive research by a Doxey resident and former parish councillor, the names of nine men lost in the First World War and one in the Second World War from Doxey have been identified.

A permanent memorial is planned in Doxey Church and the Parish Council is now keen to hear from anyone with additional information about Doxey residents lost in the World Wars to ensure the list is as complete as possible.

The current information held is shown below:

First World War

BOULT Alfred Edward. 21 years.

action at Hulluch on 21st October, 1915. Son of - Alfred and Lucy Boult, 'Abbotsford,' Doxey, Stafford.

BOWERS Edward M. Age not known. Private, 2/6th North Staffordshire Regiment. Killed in France 30th October, 1917. Next of Kin not Known. Resided at 'Rosemount', Doxey, Stafford.

BULLBROOK Samuel. 28 years. Lance Corporal, Kings Own Rifle Corps. Severely wounded (no date given) but died of his wounds on 27th March, 1920. Son of Mrs A. Bullbrook, 267 Ventnor Terrace, Doxey, Stafford.

CLARKE William Ernest. 26 years.

Wales Own (Yorkshire Regiment). Killed 23rd April, 1917. Resided at 1 Ventnor Terrace, Doxey, Stafford. Son of Edgar and Ada Clarke, 1 Clarke's Court, North Walls, Stafford. COOKE Walter. 23 years. Corporal, Royal Field Artillery. Died of his wounds on 1st December, 1917. Next of kin not known. Resided at 5 Cottage Lane, Doxey, Stafford.

HODSON Alfred. Age not known. Private, York and Lancaster Regiment. Killed in France 28th March, 1918. Next of kin not known. Resided at 119 Scarcliffe, Doxey, Stafford.

JERVIS Harry. Age not known. Acting Private, Grenadier Guards. Killed in Private, Alexandra, Princess of Bombardier, Royal Garrison Artillery.

Killed at Arras on 22nd April, 1917. Squadron, Royal Air Force. Killed Son of George Jervis, 208 Kirkstone, during operations over Germany on Doxey, Stafford.

OSBORNE Bertram. 24 years. Sapper, Royal Engineers (254th Tunnelling Company. Died at home of his wounds on 1st October, 1918. Son of Mr J. H. and Mrs S. A. Osborne, 78 Doxey, Stafford.

WHEAVER Joseph Lowndes. 28 years. Lance Corporal, Royal Engineers. Killed, location not known on 25th July, 1916. Son of John Thomas and Harriet Fanny Wheaver, 'Lyndhurst,' Doxey, Stafford.

Second World War

HAGGETT Harry. 19 years. Sergeant (Wireless Operator/Air Gunner), 51 07592708464

the 17th August, 1940.

Son of George and Florence Haggett, Ventnor Terrace, Doxey, Stafford.
